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Fall 2023 • A letter from our Executive Director

I suspect many of you, like me, are compulsive readers. In the 1990s, long before the Kindle, the Libby App from the public library, or Audible subscriptions made it easy to bring our books with us, I was committed to finding a way to make sure I was never caught without a book when I had a few spare moments to read. Thanks to the twin technological wonders of a 1997 Palm Pilot with a tiny monochrome screen and sometimes glitchy downloads from the Project Gutenberg digital library, I was able to access out-of-copyright classics by Thomas Hardy, Charlotte Brontë, and Charles Dickens. On a 160x160 pixel screen, I read at bus stops, on crowded DC subway cars, and in line at the grocery store.

Dickens was a revelation for me. Overcoming the impression I had of his work from high school, I devoured *Bleak House, Great Expectations*, and *Oliver Twist*. Only after immersing myself in Dickens' novels did I come to understand the role his writing played in illustrating the social ills of his time – poverty, child labor, and the harsh consequences of the industrial revolution.

Literature has long served as a gateway to complex experiences and situations that the general public might otherwise miss. *The Atlantic's* Clint Smith recently reassessed the role of Harriet Beacher Stowe's *Uncle Tom's Cabin* as an important catalyst for dialogue in the Abolitionist movement. Last year, in her book *Demon Copperhead*, Barbara Kingsolver invoked the techniques of Dickens to connect readers with the impact of the opioid epidemic on an entire generation in her native Appalachia.

I am excited that New Hampshire Humanities' fall programs use literature to discuss the challenges we collectively face. Our NH Big Read has introduced the themes of Andrew Krivak's *The Bear* – our relationship to nature, each other, and the legacy we leave behind – to thousands of New Hampshire residents across the state. Our Annual Celebration speaker, Jodi Picoult, has stepped up again and again to write about the difficult issues of our time. Picoult argues that fiction provides a vital entry point into these topics for a broad audience, as she said in a 2012 interview:

If you read a book that's fiction and you get caught in the characters and the plot, and swept away, really, by the fiction of it — by the nonreality — you sometimes wind up changing your reality as well [.] Often, when the last page is turned, it will haunt you. It's a much gentler approach, sometimes, into a controversial subject than nonfiction is. (NPR 2012)

Perhaps this power of fiction to change our reality is what feeds the current debate about what can and can't be read in schools and public libraries. The strength of the humanities is that it calls us to examine ideas in literature that we might find new or challenging and encourages the dialogue that great fiction creates. I hope you will all join me this fall as we read, think, and debate together.







UNITED WE STAND:

CONNECTING THROUGH CULTURE

New grant initiative uses knitting and literature to combat hate and build community

In collaboration with the White House's *United We Stand Summit* in September 2022, the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) launched a new initiative called "United We Stand: Connecting Through Culture" that leverages the arts and humanities to combat hate-motivated violence.

New Hampshire Humanities was awarded a \$50,000 grant through the NEH's *United We Stand* initiative and will use the

funds to expand our *Connections* and *Perspectives* programs and bring an innovative series, *Knit Democracy Together*, to respond to rising threats of domestic political extremism.

Connections will create a "United We Stand" reading list that will

feature books that reflect a variety of genres and reading levels to generate conversations about how communities have responded to incidents of prejudice, bias, and hate. More importantly, these books will show how these instances affect our everyday lives, and how learning about the choices people made during past episodes of injustice can help guide our choices today. Featured books will include *The Suitcase* by Chris Naylor-Ballesteros, *Together We Grow* by Susan Vaught, *I'm An American* by Darshana Khiani, and *Emmanuel's Dream* by Laurie Ann Thompson.

Grant funds will support three *Connections* book discussion series. Each series will bring together students from predominantly underserved groups with individuals from the broader community for discussion around a book from the UWS reading list. Through their discussion, participants will explore their commonalities and differences, what it means to belong to a community, and the common values we share as Americans.

Perspectives, our public book discussion program, will support the *United We Stand* initiative through literature and discussions that will explore our state and national history, the experiences of historically marginalized people,

as well issues around prejudice or hate-based violence. Featured books will include *Braiding Sweetgrass* by Robin Wall Kimmerer; *There There* by Tommy Orange; *Black Elk Speaks* by Nicholas Black Elk and John G. Neihardt; *Citizen* and *Just Us* by Claudia Rankine; and *Stony the Road: Reconstruction, White Supremacy, and the Rise of Jim Crow* by Henry Louis Gates. Through these discussions, we intend to foster empathy and understanding and create a sense of community between

participants.

To counter rising political extremism and violence, NHH will partner with former election lawyer and *Knit Democracy Together* founder Eve Jacobs-Carnahan to promote information literacy about the nation's electoral systems. Jacobs-Carnahan will lead workshops

in six towns and schools across New Hampshire between February and May 2024. During the day, students in middle or high school will learn more about the election process, and for those whose school serves as a polling station during elections, the role their school plays in it. In the evening, Jacobs will deliver a presentation on the voting process and local voting laws for adults.

Throughout each workshop, participants will create individual knitted squares (no prior experience required to participate!) and will be invited to share stories about their own experiences participating in the electoral process. At the series' end, participants' individual squares will be knitted together into a model replica of the NH State House. The model, alongside an exhibit from the Gilder Lerhman Center on the history of voting in America and participants' own stories, will be unveiled and displayed at the New Hampshire State Library in the summer of 2024, offering Granite Staters the chance to reflect on their fellow citizens' experiences of our democratic process.


