**A Conversation with Atifete Jahjaga,
Former President of Kosovo (Virtual)**



Atifete Jahjaga served as the fourth, and the first woman, President of the Republic of Kosovo. She is Kosovo's first non-partisan candidate, the first female head of state in the modern Balkans, and the youngest female world leader to be elected to the highest office. During her presidency, Atifete Jahjaga worked diligently to bring women to the forefront of Kosovo's political, economic, and social life as a means of ensuring a long-lasting democracy. Atifete Jahjaga regularly participates in national and international conferences and initiatives aimed at empowering women and supporting the survivors of sexual violence during the war. She continues to be resolute in her fight against violent extremism and radicalization and a staunch promoter of peace and stability for the Balkans and beyond. In March of 2018, President Jahjaga established the Jahjaga Foundation, an initiative that focuses on youth and women empowerment towards achieving social change in Kosovo.

DR. CHRISTINE GUSTAFSON is an Associate Professor of Politics at Saint Anselm College. Born in Omaha, Nebraska, she holds a Ph.D. in political science from Brown University, as well as master's degrees in political science and international relations from Brown University and the University of Southern California, respectively. She joined the Saint Anselm College Politics faculty in 2004 and has taught courses in international relations and comparative politics. Her areas of research include the international political economy of development, Brazilian political economy, theories of culture and institutional change, and the politics of religion. Her most recent work is a co-edited volume, entitled *Pope Francis as Global Leader: Where Theology and Politics Meet* (Palgrave, 2018).

She holds a bachelor of arts degree in media production and journalism from Flagler College in St. Augustine, Florida. She is also a member of the mayor's Homelessness Task Force in the city of Laconia, and the president of the board of directors for L'Arche Jacksonville, a nonprofit residential community serving adults with and without intellectual disabilities. When she's not reading and editing, she enjoys traveling, volunteering, yoga, and enjoying craft beer with her husband, Jeremy.

HOLLY RAMER has been a reporter for the *Associated Press* for 26 years and has covered a variety of beats, including health care, tourism, education, state politics and the presidential primary. A New Hampshire native, she began her career at *Foster's Daily Democrat* in Dover, New Hampshire, and earned a journalism degree at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

JOSH ROGERS has worked at NHPR since 2000 where he is now Senior Political Reporter and Editor.

DR. DANTE SCALA is a professor of political science at the University of New Hampshire. He has been an observer of New Hampshire politics for more than two decades, and has written two books on the Granite State and the presidential nomination process, as well as numerous shorter works.
